GAPs audits are becoming a standard requirement for many buyers of Kentucky produce crops and can give you a competitive advantage when selling. To help Kentucky growers focus on food safety and access markets that require third-party audit certification, we are offering a workshop focused on writing a farm food safety plan. The session will include an overview of different GAPs audits and details about on-farm technical assistance. You will learn the main structural components of a food safety plan such as standard operating procedures (SOPs), common food safety policies, and how to keep records efficiently. We will work through SOP and recordkeeping templates, and you will even get to write some specific to your operation with hands-on assistance. If you have a laptop, bring it along to work on the templates digitally. The format will be very interactive with opportunities to discuss challenges and develop solutions with experts.
